I. Essential Information

The SAPIENS Network Conference will address a multitude of legal, economic, political, and management issues related to procurement and sustainability, from the protection of the environment to labour rights, fair trade, and women's empowerment. The Early-Stage Researchers of the 10 European universities of the SAPIENS Network will present their research results alongside established scholars and stakeholders from around the globe.

On Thursday, 20 June, the conference will start at 9 AM and end at 6 PM. We will conclude the conference with a dinner. The conference venue is the Aston Webb Building (room WG5). The Aston Webb Building is <u>R6 on the Edgbaston Campus map</u> (Annex 1) and is situated near the East Gate of the University of Birmingham **Edgbaston Campus** (address and travel information is provided in Part II of this document).

Your contributions are vital to the success of the conference. Each speaker has been allocated 30 minutes within a panel. We value your insights and ask each speaker that your presentations do not exceed 20 minutes. The remainder of the time will be devoted to questions and discussion, usually after the presentations. Timekeeping by panel chairs will be strict to ensure a smooth and engaging conference. You may use slides (PowerPoint or other common software). Travelling by air

<u>Birmingham Airport</u> (formerly known as Birmingham International Airport) has direct flights from locations in the UK, the USA, Canada, Europe, and the Middle East.

Air-Rail Link provides a free, fast connection between the airport terminals and Birmingham International railway station. It operates every two minutes (journey time 90 seconds). Birmingham International Railway Station has frequent services to New Street Station in the city centre (journey time around 15 minutes). Alternatively, the journey by taxi from the airport to the University takes approximately half an hour. You can find black cab taxi services at the airport exit, or you can order a taxi through the <u>Uber app</u>.

Travelling by rail

Most cross-country services to Birmingham arrive at Birmingham New Street station. You can book your train tickets on <u>Trainline</u>. Up to six trains an hour depart from the Birmingham New Street station for the University station on the cross-city line (final destination: Longbridge or Redditch). Turn left as you leave the University station, and the Aston Webb Building is in Chancellor's Court, near the clock tower.

Travelling from London to Birmingham

If you travel from London, there is a frequent train service from London Euston railway station to Birmingham New Street Station (the journey time on the fastest train is around 1 hour 30 minutes). You can book your tickets on the <u>Trainline website</u>.

From <u>Heathrow Airport</u>. Take the Heathrow Express train to Paddington Station and then the Underground or a taxi to Euston Station. Alternatively, an Airbus runs from Heathrow Airport directly to Euston Station

From <u>Gatwick Airport</u>. Take the Airport Express train to Victoria Station and then the Underground or a taxi to Euston Station.

Travelling by bus

The services run frequently from the city centre. To arrive at the University North Gate from the New Street Station, walk 3 minutes to the St Martin's Queensway bus stop, then take X21 or X22 (Annex 3). Bus timetables are available on the <u>National Express West Midlands website</u>.

Taxis

There are taxi ranks at New Street station and throughout the city centre. The journey from the city centre to the Edgbaston Campus takes about ten minutes. Alternatively, you can request a ride to the Edgbaston Campus through the <u>Uber app</u>.

IV. University of Birmingham (UoB)

Founded in 1900, Birmingham represented a new model for Higher Education. It was England's first civic university, a place where students from all backgrounds were accepted on an equal basis. At the heart of the campus are the redbrick buildings of Chancellor's Court. Designed by leading architect Sir Aston Webb (who also designed other British landmarks such as the façade of Buckingham Palace and the Victoria and Albert Museum), most of the work was finished in 1909 and remains the focal point of the UoB campus. In the centre of the courtyard is the soaring clock tower, affectionately known as 'Old Joe', which can be seen across the city of Birmingham: an emblem of the University's prestige. The UoB also has a campus in Dubai located in Dubai International Academic City (DIAC).

For more than 100 years, UoB research has influenced how we live our lives. The UoB is where pacemakers and plastic heart valves were developed, where the first artificial vitamin (Vitamin C) was synthesised, and where the cavity magnetron was developed, leading to applications such as radar and the microwave oven. In addition, allergy vaccines were pioneered, the key components of artificial blood were synthesised, and the first clinical trials of the contraceptive pill outside the US were carried out, having a fundamental impact on the lives of women worldwide.







V. Birmingham Law School (BLS)

For almost a century, BLS has led the way in legal education and research. Today, it continues to provide students with innovative, challenging, and research-driven education. BLS is a truly global, civic, and diverse community reflected in our staff and students, who have important impacts around the world through research, teaching, and enterprise.

According to the Research Excellence Framework 2021 (REF2021), the BLS is among the UK's top 10 universities for research quality. 87% of BLS research activity is world-leading or internationally excellent (REF2021). According to the recent Times Higher Education's World University Rankings 2023, BLS is in the Top 75 world Law Schools.

VI. Things to see in Birmingham

Symphony Hall – considered to be one of the finest concert halls in the world, officially opened by Queen Elizabeth II on 12 June 1991.

Winterbourne House and Garden – heritage attraction/ historical building built in 1903 for John Nettlefold, a pioneer of early housing reform in Birmingham, when the city severely lacked decent homes for working people.

Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery – has 9 venues that provide a fascinating glimpse into Birmingham's rich and vibrant past and showcase world-class museum collections. Admission is free.

Sarehole Mill – a 250-year-old working watermill famous for its association with author J.R.R Tolkien, the author of the high fantasy works 'The Hobbit' and 'The Lord of the Rings'.

The Bear Grylls Adventure – experience eleven epic activities at the Bear Grylls Adventure. Escape the ordinary, experience the awesome and try something new.

Black Country Living Museum is an open-air museum of rebuilt historic buildings in Dudley, West Midlands, England. Experience the sights, sounds, smells, and tastes of the Black Country as you explore shops, houses, and industrial workshops rebuilt in the canalside village.























To arrive by bus from the University North Gate, take the X22 bus and ride four stops until the Windermere House stop. Walk 2 minutes to the Metchley Hall Stop and ride nine stops until the Woodbrooke Rd stop.

To arrive by train, go to the University railway station. After five stops, you will arrive at Bournville. After a fifteen-minute walk, you will have arrived at Cadbury World.

Alternatively, a taxi (which may be ordered via Uber app) will take 8 minutes to drive you to the Cadbruy World from the University North Gate.
